


One and Two Point Perspective Drawing

Skiing at Lutsen



Propriety in Worship and at the Lord's Supper

In Bible we have been talking about the church of Corinth and how Paul was preaching to the Christians there. Paul recognizes that the Christians in Corinth are still holding to the teachings and praises them but he tells them that they should follow Christ as the supreme example, and that the apostles follow Christ's example and that the Christians should follow the apostles' example. Paul tells them that they need to show the proper relationship between the husband and wife in public worship. Then Paul tells the Christians that believers must be aware of how their actions appear to their culture, knowing what is recognized as good behaviour. The Corinthians needed to be reminded that the most important thing is God's approval and the other stuff will just help. In connection with Lord's Supper, the Corinthians held a feast or potluck where they brought food. The rich brought more and the poor less, but the rich ate much and got drunk while the poor were left hungry. Paul then tells them that they are to celebrate the Lord's Supper occasionally to proclaim Christ's death until He comes. Also Paul explains that one should examine himself before taking part in the Lord's Supper and whoever takes part in an unworthy manner sins against the body and blood of Christ. The message then explains that a person who eats and drinks without recognizing the body of the Lord (either the Lord's physical body or the body of the church of Christ) results in the person's physical sickness or death, but not the eternal judgement. Then Paul ends by telling the Corinthians that they should eat at home if they are hungry so that when they meet each other it won't result in judgement.
