Grade 1 – Mrs. Bolt, Mrs. Hamilton

Mrs. Bolt:

Language Arts: Students have learned the reading strategy 'skippy frog'. We have been reading and writing with our five senses. We are having fun reading bear stories with mini animals.

Next week's spelling words will be: she, ship, she'll, dish, and wish.

Math: Students have been using a scale to weigh items in the classroom. They are comparing which is lighter or heavier.

Gym: In gym class students had the opportunity to use different balls to brush up on our catching and throwing skills.

Social Studies: We completed a surprise quiz on Monday and then realized we needed a little extra time to study! Our next quiz took place on Wednesday and they will be in the folders this week. We will be doing seasonal activities for the Christmas season now.

Math Grade 3: We have been busy estimating and measuring with centimetres, metres, and kilometres.

Grammar: Gr. 4 We learned about adjectives and describing nouns.

The November book report projects are due on December 15 (earlier for those leaving early for Christmas holidays). I continue to read to the class *The Bully of Barkham Street* and am into the second half where Martin starts to see that making small changes in his behaviour adds to big changes in his interactions with others. Slowly he is becoming less of a bully. Some students were excited to find two sequels in our library for this book.

In math, the grade fives have been working on multiplication strategies and will be moving on to division next week.

Report cards are being sent home today. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to teach your children this first term. I look forward to meeting to talk with those of you who are able to make it to P/T interviews next week.

Mr. Himanen:

Social Studies: Next week the class will be learning about the beginnings of exploration to the New World and the first attempts of settlement by the Europeans. We will also look at their contact with the First Nations people.

Science: The class will be looking at the atom and how the movement of electrons in the atom causes electricity next week.

Math 6: The class will be having a test next week on Wednesday, December 4. The students will need to remember the skills for multiplication, division, and rounding numbers. We will review the days prior to the test.

Mrs. Hamilton:

French: Grade 5/6 students have completed the review packets and have spent some time working in pairs to orally review the material.
